He is the proud father of 18year old Germain, who is fast following in his father's footsteps



Until today we had hoped to welcome **Vin Denson**, guest of Bill the Turnkey. Unfortunately he has had a fall and is unable to be with us but is here in spirit! It is still appropriate to acknowledge Vin's achievement in becoming the first Briton to win a stage of the Giro d'Italia, which he achieved in 1966. He recalls how Italian fans often made pretence of helping push foreigners up hills, while pulling at their brakes to slow them down! Vin was a Tour de France rider in the 1960's, and was the right hand man and team companion of Tommy Simpson when he sadly lost his life on Mont Ventoux in 1967. Vin, we respect your achievements, hope that you will be here next time and I ask his table to stand to accept the best wishes of the Pickwick Bicycle Club...

We are honoured to have 2 Dicken's descendants here today, and particularly welcome **Gerald Dickens**, guest of Boz (Ian Dickens). Gerald is a renowned actor, particularly for his one man shows based on the novels of his Great Great Grandfather, Charles Dickens. Members who wish to brush up on the Pickwick Papers, so relevant to this Club, may wish to acquire his unabridged audiobooks of the Pickwick Papers. Gerald, you are very welcome,

As ever, with a response by the President and a word or two from the Captain, the meeting ended with the joyful singing of Auld Lang Syne.



The museum has the largest display of bicycles and cycling memorabilia in the UK, including several original Pickwick Bicycle Club badges which your club has borrowed to make copies. Hope you liked them!

The charity struggles financially with a low volume of visitors and several grant applications last year were turned down largely due to funders being oversubscribed with applications.

We do hire out some bicycles, charge for outreach school visits and occasionally sell bicycles.

Taking bicycles to shows and events helps us to get some publicity and sometimes we get a payment to help offset costs.

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Last year we celebrated the bicentenary of the birth of Charles Dickens, and of course, we know how the club was founded and named after the Papers' The following account of his death however, appeared together with an obit.

The Death of Charles Dickens – 9 June 1870

DEATH OF MR. CHARLES DICKENS.

The author whose name was a household word: the genial humorist who gave us Mr. Pickwick and Mr. Micawber, and a whole gallery of such familiar personages; the writer who has done more than any other to lesson the width and the depth of that gulf of mutual ignorance, and, on one side at least, of un-Christian indifference which

prevailed thirty years ago, is no more.

Mr. Dickens died at ten minutes past six o'clock on Thursday evening. On Wednesday he was seized with an apoplectic attack, and never after recovered consciousness. It appears that on the latter day he had just sat down to dinner with his sister-in-law, Miss Hogarth, who, observing an unusual appearance in his face, became alarmed, and said she feared he was ill, proposing in the same breath to telegraph for medical assistance. Mr. Dickens replied "No, no, no; I have got the toothache, and shall be better presently." He then asked that the window might be shut; and almost immediately he lapsed into unconsciousness, from which state he never recovered till the moment of his Mr. Dickens's regular medical adviser, was telegraphed for, and arrived at Gad's-hill, in the course of Wednesday evening. He saw at once that the case was hopeless: but, for his own satisfaction as well as for that of the relatives, he summoned the assistance of Dr. Russell Reynolds, who could only concur in Mr. Beard's belief that nothing less than a miracle could save the life of their patient. For the last two or three days Mr. Dickens, although not apparently out of his usual health and spirits, had complained of a difficulty in doing his work, saying that it did not come spontaneously to him, as it used to come. Mr. Charles Dickens the younger was telegraphed for on Wednesday evening, but the message did not reach London till Thursday morning. He started instantly for his father's residence, and was present at the death-bed, with two of his sisters, Miss Hogarth, and the medical attendants. It is a significant fact that when, last year, Mr. Dickens was suddenly seized with illness at Preston, his doctor warned him not to read, at the peril of his life, and brought him almost by force to town.

The Times says :- Mr. Dickens was a man of an eminently kindly nature, and full of sympathy for all around him. This, without being paraded, makes itself manifest in his works, and we have no doubt whatever that much of the active benevolence of the present day, the interest in humble persons and humble things, and the desire to seek out and relieve every form of misery is due to the influence of his works. We feel that we have lost one of the foremost Englishmen of the age. There are clever writers enough, but no one who will take the place, literary and social, that belonged to him. It was but the other day that at the Royal Academy banquet he made the best speech of the evening, in matter, language, and manner. His powers as an actor are well known, though of late years they have been only exhibited in the narrower field of public readings. He was made to be popular, and, even irrespective of his literary genius, was an able and strong-minded man, who would have succeeded in almost any profession to which he devoted himself. We can but condole with the

public on his sudden and premature loss.

John Charles Huffam Dickens (aka 'Boz') died at Gad's Hill Place in Higham, Kent, on June 1870, aged 58.

To mark the day, we thought we'd wear a red geranium (his favourite flower) and post this warm newspaper tribute to the passing of 'Boz'.
